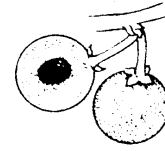




Backyard Wildlife

WILDLIFE HABITAT NOTES:

Berry-Producing Trees, Shrubs and Woody Vines



Berry crops are utilized by many wildlife species. Berry-producing plants will often attract large flocks of songbirds which can consume an entire crop in a matter of hours. Berries which fall to the ground are consumed by ground feeders such as the rufous-sided towhee and bobwhite quail, and wild strawberries are a favorite food of box turtles. Berry production is generally greatest in summer and fall, but some species (e.g., red cedar, hackberry, coralberry, sumac) hold their berries well into the winter. Bittersweet berries are not even palatable to most wildlife until mid winter and are an important late winter food for eastern bluebirds. Other species attracted to berries are the brown thrasher, blue jay, American robin, wood thrush, cedar waxwing, orioles, tanagers, cardinal, indigo bunting, junco, woodpeckers, grouse, deer, squirrel, raccoon, fox and many species of butterflies including Kentucky's state butterfly, the viceroy.
